Jo Rycroft-Malone has a nursing background and is a health services researcher who studies the processes and outcomes of evidence-informed service delivery in different health service contexts across the globe. Jo is also the Director of the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) Health Services & Delivery Research Programme, which funds research to generate evidence to improve the quality, accessibility and organisation of health and care services in the United Kingdom. She was the inaugural editor of *Worldviews on Evidence-Based Nursing*. Within implementation, her work has concentrated on the development of models, theories and frameworks such as PARIHS; testing facilitation interventions; and the evaluation of contexts and systems that enable effective implementation.
